



Alaska Department of Corrections (DOC)

Population Snapshot - Alaska DOC Counts on July 1, 2024

The Alaska Department of Corrections is a unified prison system. This means the jail system is integrated into the prison system. The Alaska Department of Corrections is responsible for 5 primary population groups within the state.

(1) Institutions, (2) probation and parole,

(3) pretrial, (4) community residential centers (CRCs) and (5) electronic monitoring (EM) are all managed by DOC.

Offenders in institutions combined with those under probation and parole makeup 75% of those in our care and custody.

With over 10,000 people in DOC custody, the combined DOC population is larger than the city of Wasilla.




THE ALASKA NATIVE HEALTH CARE SYSTEM REFERRAL PATTERN

Where are Alaska prisons located?

Alaska maintains **13 prison facilities**. Hiland Mountain Correctional Center is the only all-female facility in the state. Pt. Mackenzie Correctional Farm provides expanded life and vocational skills through farming. Spring Creek Correctional Center and Lemon Creek Correctional Center are the only close custody facilities in the state.

Data Insights

Total prisoner count

There were 4,417 inmates in Alaska prisons on July 1, 2024 . This count is lower than the previous two years.


Which prison housed the most inmates in Alaska?

Goose Creek Correctional Center housed 27% of our prison population on July 1,2024, with 1,205 inmates. Total Population



Legal status within Alaska's prisons


DOC houses sentenced, unsentenced and federal inmates as well as a small number of Title 47 holds. There were 4 individuals under a Title 47 hold at the time of this count.

Alaska's Prison Population is Aging **Prison Population Ages Over the Last 20 Years**



Last year a DOC study of prison populations revealed that the most common ages of prisoners are 30-39, and that hasn't always been the case.

During the first decade of this century, 20-29 year olds represented the largest proportion of prisoners in Alaska. In 2010, trend lines for ages 20-29 and 30-39 began to converge where they ultimately inverted beginning in 2015. The state has also seen a noticeable increase to the prison population of adults aged 50+during the past 20 years.


